Flexibility is key

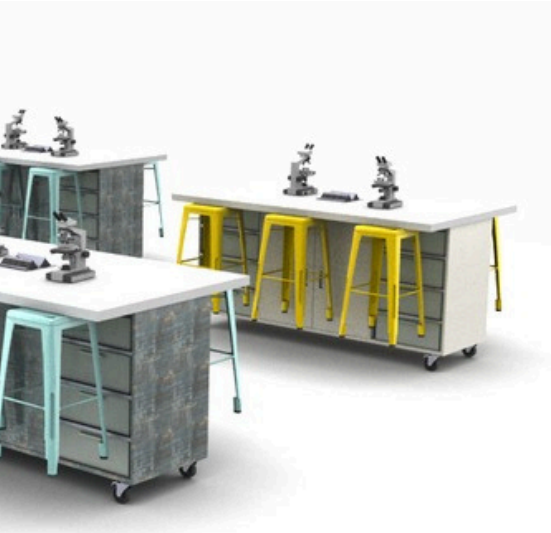

But when designing for an older age group, you want to make sure that the chairs and desks are designed to accommodate larger bodies.
